



I hold a BA (Hons) Social Work and Social Administration from Makerere University (Uganda), a Masters, in Library and Information Studies from the University of Botswana (Botswana), and a PhD in Information Studies from the University of Kwazulu-Natal (South Africa). At Masters level, my thesis research topic was “the impact of computerizing medical records on the quality of health care: a case study of selected hospitals in Botswana, while my PhD research topic was “the management of audiovisual materials in the Eastern and Southern African Regional Branch of the International Council of Archives (ESARBICA). I am currently pursuing a Masters programme in Archives and Records Management at the University of Botswana.

I started my career in 1979 as an Assistant Lecturer in records and archives at the Institute of Public Administration, in Uganda. The book is a compilation of topics on records and archives to be used by students in Library and Information Science Schools in Africa. My main area of interest and research is audiovisual archives.
